#### MESSAGE FROM REPRESENTATIVE COLONEL COMMANDANT RGJ

They are now preparing for operations across the Province. 2 RGJ have returned from yet another Balkan tour of duty, this time in Kosovo with their name very prominently in the public eye and acknowledgement for a job really well done. Both battalions are well recognised for their high standards of professionalism. Our four Green Jackets badged TA Coys are leading the way in their new Battalions with F and G Coys recently taking first and second place in the highly coveted Courage Trophy in a field of 28 TA Coys drawn from across London's TA. Our TA Riflemen from all four Coys are also providing excellent reinforcement support to the Regular Battalions. Such successes do much to enhance an already awesome reputation. Well done to you all.

The future - The Mayor's Millennium Parade on 1 July in Winchester where we exercise our Freedom with other military units, followed by the Freedom Parade in Milton Keynes on 2 July will keep the Regiment in the Public Eye. We must maximise our recruiting efforts in the light of all these positive events. And I am happy to report that both recruiting and retention together are on the verge of producing two full strength battalions for the first time in years. This is a notable achievement and the efforts of all involved are to be applauded. Keep at it. The next step is to move from up to strength to over strength.

The Regimental Association Reunion on 8 July promises to be the best yet. I am looking forward to seeing many of you there. Please make the effort to come.

## NEWS OF THE FUTURE

#### 1 RGJ

We are now halfway through our two year tour in Palace Barracks.

As a result of the decision to rear-base the Belfast Roulement Bn to the mainland we now control the whole of North and West Belfast with one company forward in Girdwood Camp. We still maintain the security of Palace Barracks and run the wider Holywood Station. Our third deployable company has been re-designated the "Expeditionary Company" with a wider remit to undertake operations anywhere in

Province

The most immediate challenge will be to support the RUC during the marching season in July and August. After a quiet Easter, the political situation remains uncertain. We anticipate an increasing number of Expeditionary Company deployments beyond the 39 Inf

Bde area into South Armagh and over to East Tyrone in the coming months.

In September the Battalion are due to deploy on Ex QUEBEC VENTURE. This will be conducted at Otterburn and Kielder as well as various locations in Galloway and Dumfries. This will not only provide a brief respite from operations in Province, but will also allow us to address some of the more conventional war fighting skills which inevitably have taken a back seat to the specific skills and tactics required in Northern Ireland. We are hoping to get members of the RRV and the London Regt involved in this exercise.

On the sporting front we will again enter various competitions run in Province. We have enioved excellent some achievements so far this year at individual and team level. Having finished as runners up in the last Northern Ireland novices boxing championships this year we will be looking to win it this Rugby has seen some major success with 4 members of the battalion regularly playing for the Infantry and Army Teams. We won the Northern Ireland Rugby 7's title and are, at the time of writing, taking part in the Army competition at Over and above Aldershot. those established gladiators, the remainder of the battalion will be competing for the intercompany Summer and Winter Shields.

A number of personalities are due to change soon. Lt Col JIS **Plastow** assumes command of the battalion from Lt Col D St J **Homer** who in turn takes up a post in HQNI on promotion. CSgt **McCaffrey** returns from

the London Regt to take over from WO2 Fozzard as CSM A Company, and WO2 Couzens takes over from WO2 Brown as CSM HO Company.

In summary, the battalion has seen an increase in it's operational tempo as a result of radical changes across the Province. The fact that we are busy on every front merely serves to provide greater focus to our activities. We still have a year to go and undoubtedly many more challenges to meet.

#### 2 RGJ

The Battalion is now back in Paderborn having completed OP AGRICOLA 2 and it's well earned post operational tour leave.

We are now looking forward to a stable year before returning to the Balkans in April 2001 for our third tour in as many years!

Training and Cadres will dominate the period up to Summer leave in August. The JNCO Cadre will be sponsored by A Company - under the command of Maj Plummer and the usual raft of Support Company Cadres will bring the traditional influx of new faces into the Mortar, Recce and Anti-Tank Platoons. When the battalion reforms after leave it will start the process of acquainting itself with war fighting, including a 20 Armd Bde concentration at Drawsko-Pomorski training area. November will see the platoon and section commanders being subjected to a bit of pressure as they are put through their paces on a Cadre run by B Company under Maj Sanders.

R Company - under Mai

Noble - will be taking part in Freedom Parades in Winchester and Milton Keynes over the first weekend of July. This will be followed by and extensive KAPE tour. With recruiting highlighted for particular attention, each of the companies will be sending "Satisfied Soldiers" to all of the RGJ ACIOs for a week long project.

Inter Company sport will feature highly with hockey, cricket, athletics, basketball, rugby, football and boxing competitions being hotly contested, in the quest to find the Champion Company.

After Christmas the Battalion begin preparations for our tour of duty in Bosnia.

A number of Battalion personalities will change over the next six months. Maj Doran returns to take over A Cov from Maj Plummer and Mai Thomson takes over R Cov from Maj Noble. Capt Grey will replace Capt Gilbert as Families Officer, the latter moving to the Training Wing. Capt Needham is moving to the QMs department as QM(T). Capt Wilson will take over the Anti Tank platoon and Capt Wingfield the Mortar platoon. WO2 Halford will take over as CSM S Coy from WO2 Blackman. CSgt Matthews finishes as CQMS A Coy to take over from WO2 Burke as CSM B Coy with Sgt Hurley returning from ITC Catterick to be CQMS A Cov.

In conclusion, the next few months are certain to be busy and full of surprising new challenges. We will face up to all that comes our way with traditional Green Jacket professionalism and pride

A very successful TA Day on 25th March produced a dozen potential recruits and we currently have nineteen in the training cycle. This intake is the basis of forming the second platoon at Oxford in January 2001.

It is also a good start towards achieving the target of 35 recruits set by the Commanding Officer.

Most of the training weekends in May and June will be taken up with drill practice in preparation for the Freedom of Milton Keynes on 2 May. We take part along with E Coy, 2RGJ and the Light Div Band. Although our involvement is mainly in support roles such as guards and ushers we are looking forward to what is a RGJ family day.

#### ITC CATTERICK

## ITC Catterick continues to produce soldiers ready to take their place on operations.

Frequently trainees pass out and find themselves in an operational theatre sometimes within only a few days. This is particularly evident for the Riflemen joining 1 and 2 RGJ.

There have been some changes to the training programme here at ITC and indeed a combined phase one and phase two programme was reintroduced in May. This will be similar to the old 22 week basic training course but has been extended to 24 weeks. It is pleasing to report that this part of the trial will be run by a Light Division training team. The introduction of Operations in Built up Areas training has proved to be a worthwhile addition and has been a great success. The reintroduction of GPMG training has provided

greater variety and interest and results in an enhanced capability, which was obviously lacking at platoon level.

The course loading system often means that non RGJ staff instruct Light Division platoons but wherever possible this is kept to a minimum. The Mentor system whereby each company is allocated a RGJ NCO continues to be a success in providing a point of contact and advice, and importantly to supply a feeling of Regimental integrity for the trainces.

27 of the permanent staff posts here are occupied by RGJ personnel with Lt Col DW Brown commanding the 1st Bn.

Recent new arrivals have included Cpl Atkinson and Cpl Dennis from 1 RGJ and Lt Egan and Sgt Ryder from 2 RGJ. Departing with our thanks are Cpl French from 1 RGJ and Sgt Healy from 2 RGJ.

Infantry training at ITC Catterick reflects the requirements of an ever more committed Field Army and as such draws increasingly upon the expertise and dedication of the JNCO's here, who put in many extra hours to ensure the success of the Trainces when posted to their Battalions.

#### **ATR WINCHESTER**

The uncertainty of the future of training Green Jacket recruits at Winchester continues but there have been no concrete developments to date.

The infantry is still keen to combine Phase 1 and Phase 2 training at a centralised location and we currently have a Light Division training team from ITC Catterick with us, looking at our training methods before trialing a platoon early this summer. If this trial cuts down wastage rates, the infantry will have to argue its case before any agreement to combine the two phases of training is made.

As mentioned in the last issue, the Army Foundation Scheme (AFS) Company here has now been scrapped and recruits do a one week induction course instead prior to immediate entry to Phase I training, which remains at 11 weeks. The whole 12 weeks training will be done with C Company and 20 (Corunna) Platoon have been formed to cope with the extra numbers. If all platoons in the company are full, C Company will be training total of 240 recruits of which 160 will be Light Division.

In addition to the Army Air Corps in the Company manned by AAC instructors, we are now training AGC (SPS), RAC, RLC, R Sigs, Int Corps, RGBW, RRW RWF and even Military Police recruits! We are delighted to report that the Infantry recruits continue to do well and the Company has won the Winchester Cup for the Best Section in an intake nine times out of the last twelve. (This despite the fact RHQ have tried to make the competition cheat proof!) We also look forward to retaining the trophy for the shoot against the Winchester and District branch of the Association which we won with recruits in their third week of training.

The Association weekend over 8/9 July will be occupying some of our energies this summer when we look forward to meeting many of you.
